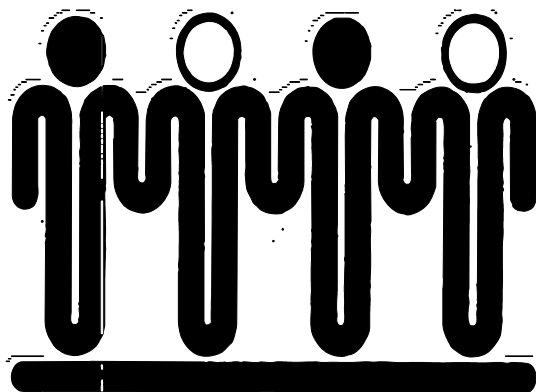

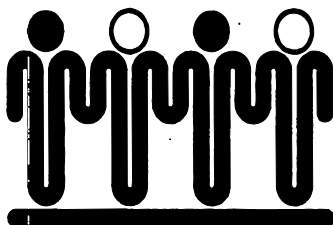
Sonoma County Schools
