## Light Brown Apple Moth

**We need your help!** Be on the lookout for Light Brown Apple Moth (LBAM), especially on plants from the following counties: **Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Monterey, San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, and Solano.**

**Look for webbing and rolled leaves on new growth. Check inside rolled leaves for larvae or pupae!**



**Larvae** are translucent green, with a light brown head. When fully grown, the larvae are about 1/2 to 2/3 inch long. The larvae can wiggle vigorously backwards and/or hang on the plant, or drop to the ground with a silken thread when disturbed.



**Pupae** are greenish in color, turning reddish brown with age, and are about 1/2 inch long.



**Adults** appear bell shaped at rest and are about 1/4 to 1/2 inch long. Males are smaller than females and have a light brown coloration. The lower half of the wing has various patterns of darker markings. Females have fewer dark markings on the wings than the males.

**If you spot a pest that looks like the Light Brown Apple Moth, catch it, and call the Sonoma County Agricultural Commissioner's Office at 707-565-2371.**
